## CHEMUNG

### DRUG FREE COMMUNITY COALITION OF CHEMUNG COUNTY (DFCC)

**The DFCC participated in the DEA Take Back Day in October and had a great turnout.** Southport had 113 cars and collected 312 pounds; West Elmira collected 387.2 pounds and had 101 participants. 12 containers of sharps were also collected in partnership with Chemung County nursing facility. The SADD club students participated and helped with data collection and outreach. Resource information was handed out at the event. The group discussed having a year-round disposal awareness campaign and partnerships with pharmacies.

**DFCC Social media posts** occur every Monday, Wednesday, and Friday and include coalition meeting information, safety tips for the holidays, highlights of community partners' events, and are geared to **providing awareness to the community.**

DFCC coalition members were invited to take part in **Youth Engagement training part two with Kym Laube** in October, focused on putting strategies into action in your community. Kym Laube, a nationally recognized speaker, equips youth to lead with confidence. Round table discussions followed the training. **The DFCC coalition will shift its focus to youth empowerment and engagement in 2026.**

The Chemung Futures group organized a **comprehensive report summarizing the group's work in 2025.** The report includes summaries of meetings with discussion highlights, mission and vision statement development, and final recommendations for youth involvement. The report will be shared at the January DFCC meeting.



## LIVINGSTON

### LIVINGSTON COUNTY SUICIDE PREVENTION TASK FORCE

During the month of November, Resilience Awareness Month, **the Suicide Prevention Task Force partnered with the Trauma Informed Communities Committee to launch a lawn-sign campaign,** which distributed lawn signs with **positive strength-based messages** around the community to promote coping, connection, and hope. QR codes to the Credible Mind resources are located at the bottom of the signs. These messages opened up conversations across the county and act as constant visual cues in everyday spaces, which help to widen the support across the community. The Task Force tabled at schools during lunch hours talking to students and offering resilience resources.

The **Step by Step Support Group** offers a safe and welcoming space to the community. Attendees participated in a Holiday craft in the month of December.

The Suicide Prevention coalition has done a considerable amount of **community outreach throughout the year.** At one of the last events of the year, the coalition **tabled at Avon schools** in November for the Livingston County Special Education and Disability Resource Fair and at Caledonia-Mumford School district.

**The Task Force has acquired so many great new connections, including schools.** Coalition chair Lynne Mignemi spoke at the Avon CSD support meeting, speaking about the task force, the e-Connect tool, and the Credible Mind platform.

## SENECA

### SENECA COUNTY SUICIDE PREVENTION COALITION OPIOID OVERDOSE TASK FORCE

Seneca County held its **annual Youth Forum** in October. 80 students in grades 6-8 from all Seneca County school districts attended the day-long event. **Asked why it is important for youth to come together for a day like this, Delaney McDonald a Sophomore at Mynderse Academy, stated that it is "a great way to form relationships with peers that you do not know or do not have the opportunity to work with, helps with skills to lead a group, group project and carries over into real life and school."** Overall, the youth forum **helps to build leadership, confidence, resilience, and determination.** (See story in photos).

**The Seneca County Suicide Prevention Coalition held its first annual Clarence Award writing contest, which aligned with the annual Seneca Falls It's a Wonderful Life Festival.** Based on the character Clarence, who shows the character George how meaningful life is, the contest asked students to describe how an adult has made a positive impact in their lives. Over 125 nominations were received, and two winners were chosen. See the complete story and winners in the photo section.

The Seneca County **Opioid Overdose Task Force discussed regional overdose trends and Narcan distribution efforts in Seneca County,** with representatives from law enforcement, public health, and addiction services. The group focused on the growing issue of counterfeit pills laced with fentanyl. **Potential outreach efforts and the importance of making Narcan available in public places** will be the group's efforts going forward.

## STEUBEN

### STEUBEN PREVENTION COALITION: OPIOID COMMITTEE

During the October **Drug Take Back Day**, the Steuben opioid coalition assisted and partnered with the Steuben County Sheriff's Office. **566.1 pounds of unused medications were collected.**

The Steuben Opioid Coalition held its **annual Youth Forum** on November 6, 2025, at the Corning Radisson. **Students from Steuben County schools attended the day-long forum** to participate in Mental Health First Aid Training, keynote speaker seminars, and Team building. Adults who attended participated in *the Hidden in Plain Sight* training.

**In October, the coalition came together for its annual Coaster and Trunk or Treat Packing day. 3000 coasters were packaged** with letters for distribution to local restaurants/bars just before the holidays **to bring awareness of fentanyl in counterfeit pills.** Candy bags were also packed for the annual trunk or treat (see photos).


The Steuben Coalition is very active in providing Narcan training to the community. **In 2025, members of the coalition provided 60 training sessions and trained 614 participants.** Wall units continue to be placed throughout the community. **120 units have been placed in Public access spaces as well as private locations.**

The coalition **provided community outreach throughout the year, tabling at various events** such as community health fairs, Girls on the Run, Speaker Jam, Drug Take Back Day, and the Youth Action Forum, to name a few.

**The Opioid committee continues its great work providing information and awareness to the community** through outdoor billboards, newspaper advertising, the annual coaster project, and sharing opioid related articles through their newsletter (see photos).



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**SCHUYLER**

**SUICIDE AWARENESS FOR EVERYONE  
(S.A.F.E.)**

In October, **SAFE** tabled at the annual **Harvest Festival in Montour Falls**, where they passed out gun safety publications and gun locks, stress balls, keychains, and medication lock boxes. In December, **SAFE** tabled at **Village Christmas in Watkins Glen**, handing out resources and coffee sleeves.

Over several meetings, the coalition discussed the New York Times article about a teen who took their life after being suicidal and talking to ChatGPT. The teen turned to AI for companionship and advice. The group discussed how AI is not bad or inaccurate, but youth may not necessarily have the knowledge on how to decipher misinformation. **The coalition discussed developing a campaign to educate parents/guardians and those working with youth on the risks of AI.** The focus was to have the messaging focused on how AI can be a good resource if used correctly, but how it can also be dangerous, and advocating for alternative resources such as 988. Two resources that were discussed were the documentary **Can't Look Away**, which shows the devastating impact of social media on young users, and **60 Minutes AI chatbots raise concerns for children, experts warn**, a 60 Minutes piece that explains how research shows that chatbots like character AI can be harmful to children. The coalition will continue to work on this campaign in the new year.

Amanda and Jen will be joining the **Veterans Coffee Talk at Holy Cow in December** to promote the coalition and resources.

**ONTARIO COUNTY SUICIDE

COALITION OF ONTARIO COUNTY**

The Ontario County Suicide Prevention Coalition and Substance Abuse Prevention Coalition **have merged into one Mental Health and Wellness Coalition to create greater alignment and incorporate a broader mental health focus**, based also on one of Ontario's CHA priorities, which is depression.

In October, the coalition, in partnership with the Ontario County Sheriff's office and Mead Pharmacy, participated in **Take Back Day, collecting over 425 pounds of unused medications and sharps**, focusing on keeping unused or unwanted medications out of homes and landfills to keep the community safe and healthy. This was the highest amount collected in October in Ontario County! Narcan training was provided to anyone interested. Conversations started by asking if you wanted Narcan for your medicine cabinet, which sparked interest and further conversation.

At the December meeting, the coalition brainstormed ideas for **a new mission, vision, and name change** for the newly merged coalitions. Ideas will be finalized at the upcoming meeting.

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# YATES

## YATES PREVENTION COALITION

The Yates Prevention coalition has new leadership! **Lisa Principio, Director of Yates County Community Services, has taken over as the new chair for the coalition.** The four subcommittees (Suicide Prevention, Substance Use Prevention, Traumatic Loss Team, and Outreach and Implementation have kept their current chairs).

The coalition was invited to the **QPR (Question, Persuade, and Refer) suicide gatekeeper training** in place of the October meeting. Partnering with Keuka College, **84 individuals, including coalition members, were trained.** The suicide prevention coalition adopted the **Lock and Talk program** this year and is working with gun shops on **lethal means safety** and handing out hunter safety kits. The Out of Darkness Walk had over 100 in attendance and raised \$9000.

The **substance use prevention coalition's focus in the coming year will be on vaping.** The coalition is working with schools to implement vape detectors.

The **Implementation and Outreach Subcommittee is focusing on website development and defining goals.** They tabled at Keuka College's Passport to Wellness event in November. They will participate in Bell Ringing on December 19<sup>th</sup> at Tops in Penn Yan.

## WAYNE COUNTY OPIOID TASK FORCE

Wayne Public Health Educators attended the **statewide Harm Reduction Symposium** where they learned of Monroe County's **Community Action Coalition Committed to Uprooting Stigma (C.A.C.T.U.S)** who spoke about changing the conversation around substance use disorder. They will keep in touch with the group to learn more about **fighting the harmful effects of substance use disorder stigma through education, resources, and community engagement.** Harm Reduction kits were donated throughout the community.

**A demonstration of Credible Mind was given by Public Health Fellow Craig Hunt** who walked the coalition through its features. Since the launch of the platform in July, **949 people have joined with the most used group being those 13-17 years and the top topic being depression.**

The group discussed the success of Take Back Day and Opioid Settlement funding and Jay Roscup, a **settlement funding recipient talked about the STEADY work program** in Wayne County.

## Seneca County *It's a Wonderful Life Festival*

The Seneca County Suicide Prevention Coalition honored its **first annual Clarence Award** winners at the annual *It's a Wonderful Life Festival* in December. The event, *Wonderful Wings: Soaring with hope, empowering YOUth*, included a panel discussion and recognized the Clarence Award winners who **strengthen connections with youth**.

Over 100 people attended to listen to panelists **Mary Seitz from the NYS Office for Mental Health, Dominique Richardson, 211/988 Outreach Specialist, and South Seneca social worker Brooke Habberfield**. Mary talked about building protective factors for youth, youth empowerment, mental health first aid training, and the release of the 5-year suicide prevention strategies. Dominique discussed warning signs, judgment-free conversations through 988, a safe, confidential platform, and resources offered through 211 and 988. Brooke shared the Sources of Strength program, a youth-led mental awareness program that gives youth opportunities to engage in community service and school activities that connect kids with everyone in the schools.

Following the panel discussion, the winners of the first annual Clarence award were honored: **Ashley Leaderman, a Seneca Falls teacher, and Caeiln Kordziel, a Romulus school teacher**. Students who nominated Ashley Leaderman said **they appreciate her because she always brightens their day, they can look up to her, and her office door is always open, where they can go to chat about anything**. Students who nominated music teacher Caeiln Kordziel shared that **she cares about everyone, lights up their lives, and is the person to go to to talk about anything**.

Clarence Award Honorees included Ralph Walborn, Romulus coach, Lisa Anderson, Seneca Falls school teacher, and Michael Middas, Seneca Falls school board member.

## Seneca County Youth Forum

The Seneca County Youth Forum took place in October 2025 on the Hobart and William Smith campus. Students were engaged in a day of breakout sessions along with lunch, and a tour of the campus.

The four break-out sessions offered to the students included data and safety, team building, mental health, and leadership.

The data session included conversations about the results of the CLYDE survey that students participate in every other year. Topics included bullying, life stressors, and modes of support in schools and the community. The session was led by Stephanie Snyder from the National Guard counterdrug program.

The team-building session included activities where students were asked to work together with random students. The activities followed the Form/Norm/Storm/Preform technique, guiding students to discover how to build relationships, handle conflict, evolve from uncertainty, and trust to reach goals and solve problems. These sessions were led by Suicide Prevention Coalition Chair, Karen Burcroff.

The mental health session held conversations about being yourself, what mental health means, reaching out to a support person/asking for help, and handling stressors in your life.

The leadership session engaged students in conversations about becoming a role model, how one can make a difference, and what it takes to be a leader. Sessions were led by Casey Bouch from the Chamber of Commerce and Jeff Trout, Fayette Town Supervisor.

Students were given resources, including a laminated help/crisis/emergency sheet (pictured) and a booklet of County resources.





